Summary of the FP-CIP

The Kenya Family Planning Costed Implementation Plan (FP-CIP) 2021-2024 sets out the strategic direction, the areas of investment, the implementation framework and the resources that are required in the National Family Planning Programme between 2021 and 2024. It is the third FP-CIP under the Kenya Health Policy 2014–2030.

It will be used to:

- Provide a unified strategy and implementation roadmap for FP
- Provide a framework to guide the development of county-level FP-CIPs
- Define the budgetary requirements of the FP programme
- Guide the mobilisation of resources from government, development partners and private sector
- Provide a framework for inclusive participation of multiple stakeholders



Overall vision, mission and goal

VISION	A country where citizens enjoy and make informed choices on their sexual and reproductive health
MISSION	To ensure that citizens have access to quality, affordable, safe, comprehensive, and equitable family planning services
GOAL	Increase modern contraceptive prevalence rates (mCPR) from 44.2% to 46.5% and reduce unmet need for family planning from 18% in 2020 to 9% among women of reproductive age by 2024.

Thematic areas and outcomes

Thematic area	Outcomes
1. Commodity security	Increased uptake of modern contraceptive methods
2. Financing and sustainability	Adequate and sustainable domestic financial resources secured to fulfil requirements of the FP Program
3. Stewardship and governance	Improved stewardship, management, and coordination capacity of the GoK for FP at all levels (national and county) and across sectors
4. Information management	Policies that improve equitable and affordable access to quality FP services and information adopted and implemented
5. Service delivery	Increased access and utilization of quality FP services by all population segments through a rights-based approach
6. Demand creation	Increased demand among populations with unmet need for modern contraception through a rights-based approach

High Impact Interventions

The selection of interventions has been guided by the High Impact Practices on Family Planning (HIP), identified based on demonstrated magnitude of impact on contraceptive use.

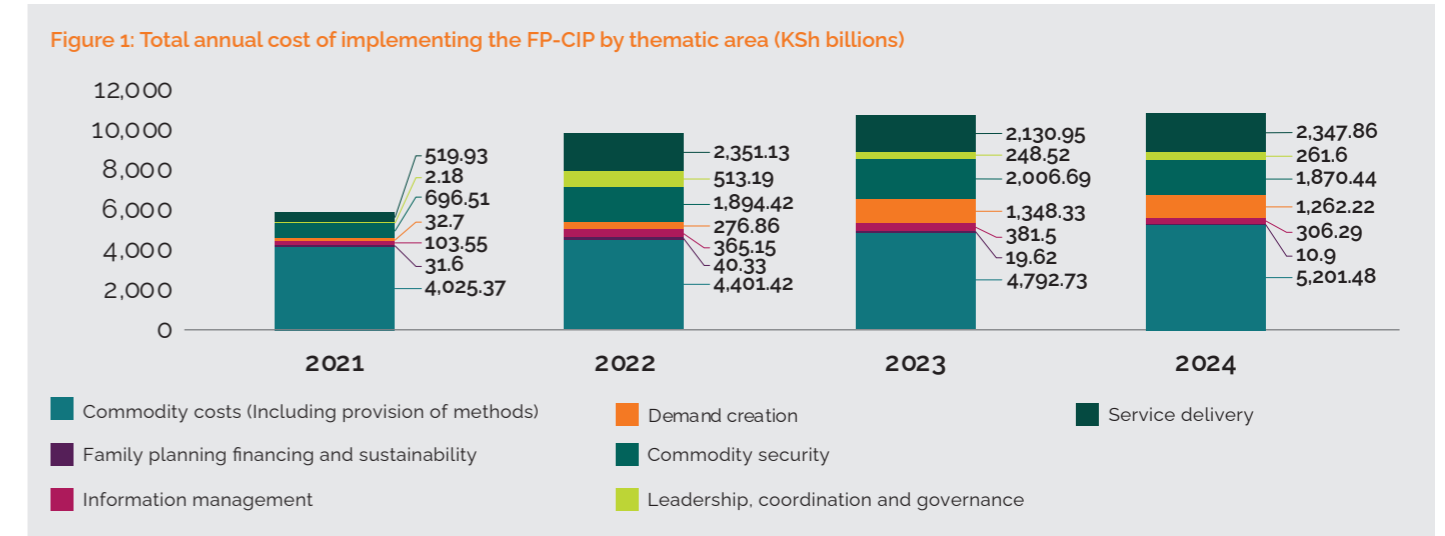

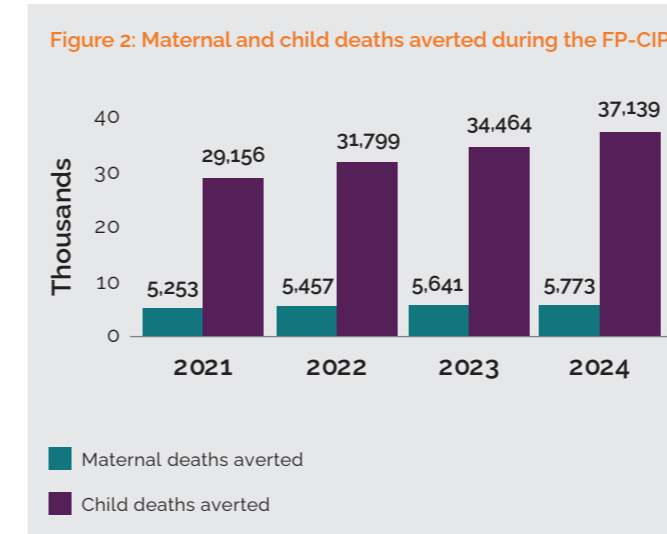
Resource requirements for the FP-CIP 2020-2024

An activity-based costing was carried out to estimate the resource requirements for implementing the FP-CIP. As shown below, the annual funding requirement for the FP-CIP will be over KSh 5 billion in the first year and will increase significantly after that. In terms of funding by thematic area, the funding requirements are largest for service delivery (47%) followed by commodity security (39%). This cost estimation will guide resource mobilization efforts from national and county governments as well as development partners and other stakeholders.



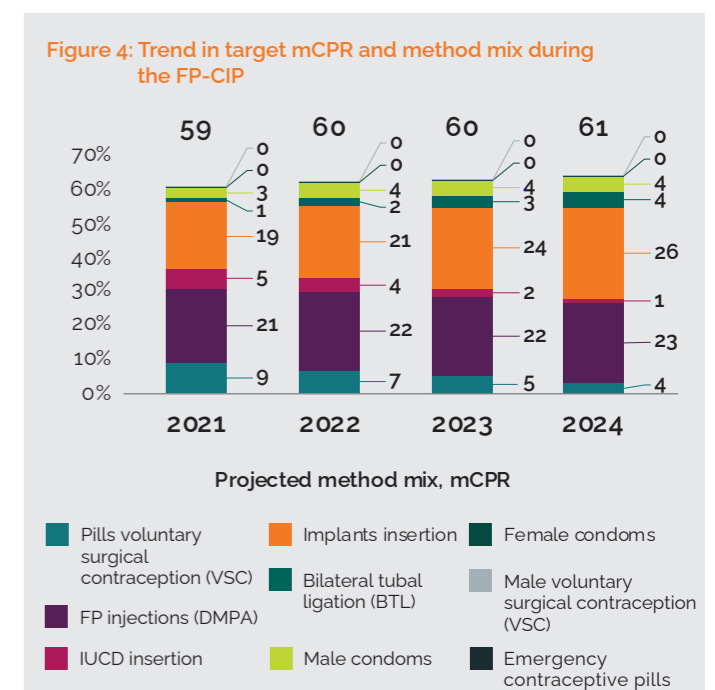
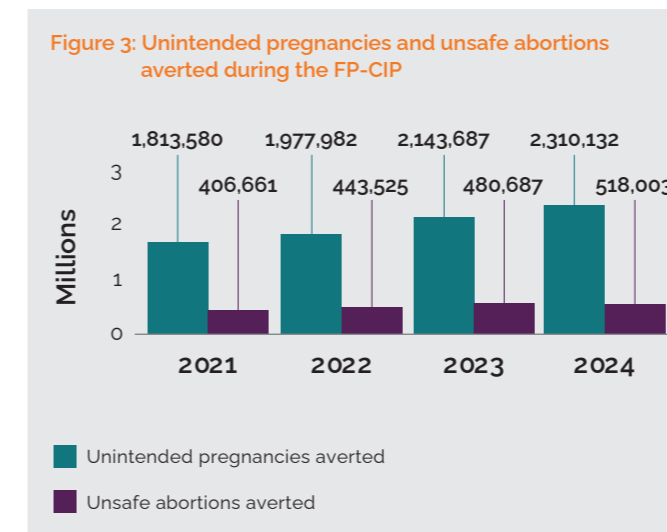
Impact

The FP-CIP aims to achieve a modern contraceptive prevalence rate of 61.11% from a baseline of 58 in 2020 through better selection of interventions, more targeted approach to geographic areas and focus on groups with special needs. The method mix shows a significant increase in implants and tubal ligation and a significant reduction in the use of pills and IUCDs during the implementation period of the FP-CIP.



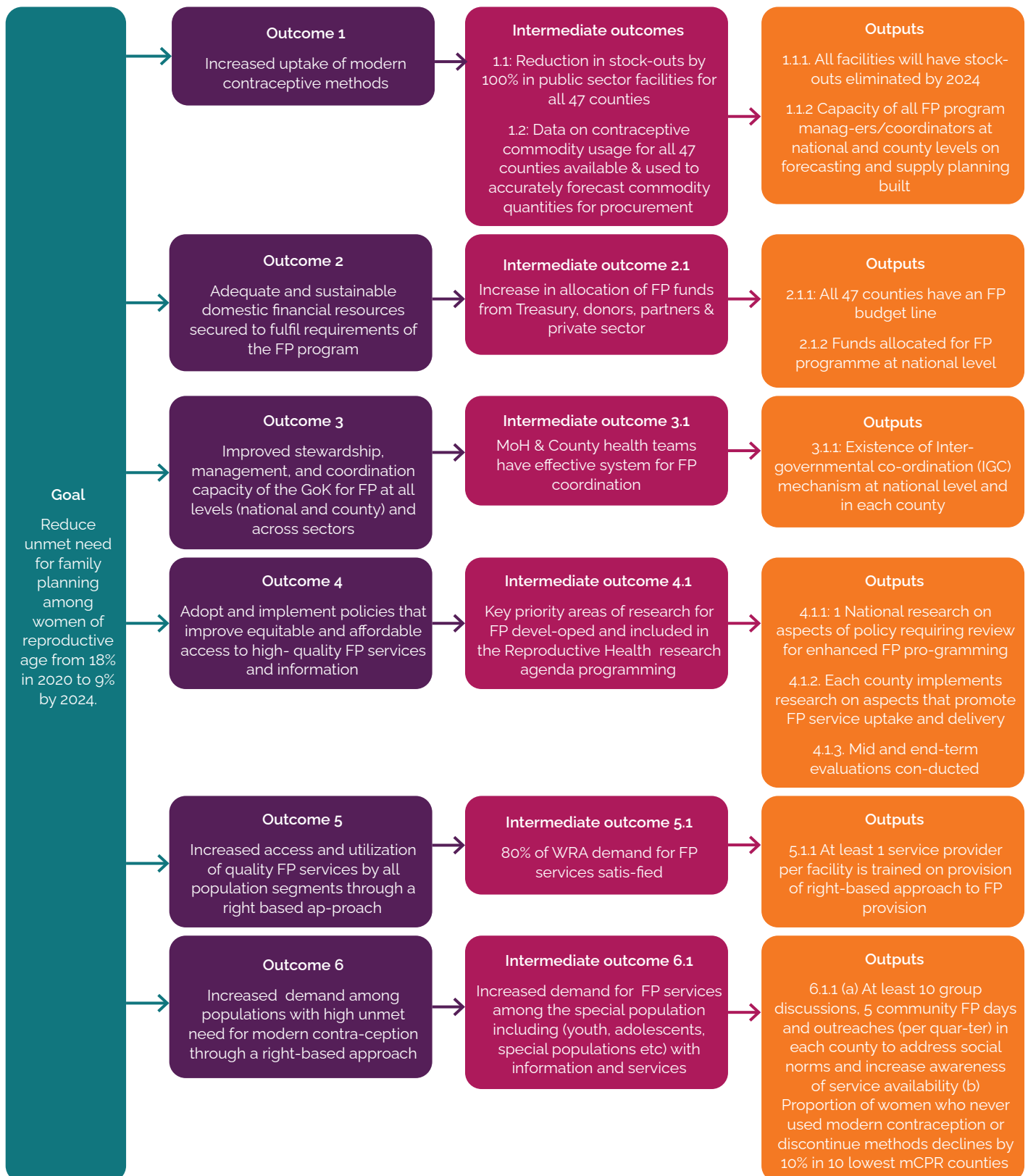
